DEADLINE CHANGE

In order to assure the best possible *Bandspread* each month we must set a practical *deadline for submission* of articles to the editor.

The deadline for each issue will be posted *early* each month on the listserv and on the Sunday night WVARA net. Postings may be made elsewhere as well.

We greatly appreciate the contributions that individual members have made to *The Bandspread*. It is those contributions that make the newsletter what it is today. We hope this new policy will encourage previous and future contributors to begin to consider, *early* in the month, what contributions they may wish to submit so that we can get them by the deadline. -ed.

Dear Dr. Elmer...

What can you tell me about "nets"?

A radio net is a communications activity which usually occurs on a specific frequency at a particular time and day, which is devoted to some specific purpose. Nets may also be created on a moment's notice to deal with some sort of emergency. There are many nets available for participation, depending upon your class of license (i.e: HF and VHF) and your interests.

In the local area at least four nets meet weekly on a regular basis and others are convened as needed. Net schedules are listed, usually on the front page, in *The Bandspread*.

Nets may include many operators but always have someone in charge. That station is called the "Net Control Station" and that station literally controls operations during the net. Usually a roll call will be read, which is made up of stations who frequently check in to that net. Opportunities will also be made for stations not on the roll call, and stations who stop participating are removed from that list.

Some HF nets are conducted for the benefit of stations trying to work specific areas, such as "county hunters." They seek awards for working all the counties in the U.S. In such a net, stations will announce their county and state and persons desiring contact with that location are given the chance to communicate.

Many other nets exist for specific purposes as well. The MARCO net is a meeting place for amateurs who are also M.D's. Mid-Cars is a net on 7.258 mHz which acts as a meeting place for mobile amateurs who are travelling and wish to connect with other mobiles and people they know. Lots of base stations use this net as well.

An emergency services net may be called at any time of the day or night and serves the needs presented by the problem. Weather nets, for example, are held locally when watches or warnings are issued affecting the area. These nets provide a means for the National Weather Service to obtain real-time information about what trained spotters are seeing at that moment. Post-disaster nets meet to aid relatives, some of whom may be far away, to ascertain the health and welfare of a loved one who was in the disaster zone.

An important consideration in joining a net is to play by the rules. Those rules may be very simple, but in any case are usually announced at the start of the net. In all cases, work through the net control and stay in the net until it's over unless you tell net control that you must leave.

Net participation is a wonderful learning tool, and you should find nets that meet your interests and then become a member.

A OCWA REMINDER:

Every second Saturday morning, prior to the monthly QCWA meeting, there will be a QCWA net, at 10 A.M., on the 145.230 repeater. We'll discuss such things as where the QCWA and the CAARLA luncheon meetings will be held that day and what the programs for each will be.

This would also be a good time to make ham radiorelated announcements including amateur-related equipment that you might want to buy, sell or trade.

Editorial

DUES ARE DUE! - But what do our dues DO?

This article started out as a yearly dues-are-due announcement but then we decided that it might be interesting if we attempted to list all the things that your dues (and your participation) accomplish to support Amateur Radio and to benefit the public in the Wabash Valley. What we discovered amazed us.

Here is a compilation of what we accomplish each year. It's divided into three categories, Sponsor, Support and Point of Contact. Sometimes a given activity falls under more than one of the categories, so it's more difficult to decide where they belong, but you can rearrange them if you like.

Sponsor: We initiate, organize, financially underwrite and carry out the project under the direct auspices of the WVARA and its Board of Directors. This is what we are most proud of and it is where we concentrate our efforts.

We sponsor, organize and teach from one to three beginner or upgrade classes per year.

We hold the Brentlinger Award dinner each March in which we honor an outstanding amateur in the Wabash Valley, not necessarily a member.

We sponsor a yearly Field Day exercise in which we invite all amateurs and local clubs to participate. On average we have approximately 30 operators with another 30 people acting as support personnel.

We officially sponsor and support Monthly VE testing, alternating between Terre Haute, IN, and Marshall, IL.

We publish a six to eight page monthly newsletter. You are reading it now.

We sponsor and participate locally in the Indiana Bison Stampede. (a mini Field Day, if you will.)

We host a yearly Amateur Radio picnic at which we invite all local hams. It is a pitch-in but we supply the meat - (ham)burgers and hotdogs are the usual fare.

We hold a mini-hamfest which we call the Tailgate Party.

We maintain an Amateur Radio station which can be used for emergency communications and is open to the public once a week.

<u>Support</u>: We might not run an activity, but we provide support with radio operators and often we enhance the quality and scope of the original project. Most participation here recurs on a yearly basis because the sponsoring organization either just likes to have our support or would be severely diminished without our presence.

We provide direct communications for 2 races:

- the Terre Haute Triathlon
- the Deuces Wild Duathlon in Marshall, IL

The club promotes and members support the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life; last year we participated with two teams.

Individual members support the Ryves Hall children's center.

We support the 7-county Illiana Skywarn organization.

Most Vigo Co. ARES members are also WVARA members.

Among its members, the Club boasts both the ARRL Indiana Section Emergency Coordinator plus the Indiana Radio Club Council's Treasurer.

We own and maintain the 146.685 repeater.

We organize and staff Santa at the Mall where children can talk to 'Santa' on the radio.

Individual members belong to the local Red Cross chapter and support its efforts in the areas of radio communication and other support positions.

Point of Contact: This means we act as a reference point to connect one group which has a need with another group which can fill that need.

We provide publicity and encourage Amateur Radio participation in community events such as:

- -NWS WX Spotters' class.
- -Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) which includes representatives from police, fire, hospitals, co. health dept., ambulance and other agencies.

We send participants to the Mass Casualty Incident Committee meetings and exercises.

We boast the last four out of five IRCC Amateurs Of-The-Year.

We provide publicity for other local Radio Clubs including the...

- Rose Hulman Radio Club.
- ISU Radio Club.
- TH Radio Club.
- Eastside Outdoor Ham Club.

At the risk of sounding boastful, we think this is a pretty impressive list. The dues you pay and the activities you participate in serve both the local Amateur Radio community and the greater Wabash Valley public. So you may take great pride in your support of the Wabash Valley Amateur Radio Association. Well done, folks! -ed.

Why Should I be a Weather Spotter?

First of all and the first thing to remember is that our nets are not weather nets, but, severe weather nets and these nets are for reporting severe weather to The National Weather Service in Indianapolis. We are linked to the National Weather service in Indy via the 444.350 W9SKI Illiana Skywarn repeater. The NWS needs our reports from the field, in this case I mean, western Indiana and eastern Illinois. NWS can see the top of a storm, but they are really not sure what is happening on the ground and that's where we are needed.

During the Memorial Day weekend Sunday, over 95 percent of the warnings sent out by The National Weather service were either started from information given by our spotters right here in the 2 state area, or confirmed by them. The information we gave was broadcast on National Weather Service radio and then sent by wire services to the media outlets in our area so that the public could be warned of the coming storms.

This storm system was a big event. Probably the biggest event we had been involved in for some years. But it's the same for a large severe system or a small one. Fifty-six amateurs checked in on the 146.685 repeater that day, 600 amateurs on other nets in our 39 county region and gave us a hand and we could have used more.

Why should I attend the weather spotter's class? Because it is so important that we all know what we are seeing when we look at a coming storm. Remember, based on the information given above, someone's life may be saved if you know what to look for and report what you see in time.

So, if you're not already a part of Illiana Skywarn but you are interested in what we do, we invite you to get involved. You can take that first step but attending either of the weather spotter's classes given on the same night, May 7, at either Terre Haute, IN or Paris IL - see the article on page 1.
