MARV CARMONY, W9KT - SK

Marv Carmony, W9KT (ex W9MGC), became a Silent Key December 27, 2006. Mary's interest in Ham Radio goes back to his high school years when he obtained his original call.

He had a real interest in CW and was a first class CW operator. This skill allowed him to serve as a Radio Officer in the Merchant Marine during WWII, and later as a radio operator with American Airlines. It is difficult to visualize these days air to ground communications during the late 1940s being conducted using Morse Code, but that is what Mary did when he was with American. Using these experiences, he became an excellent high speed CW operator. For many years his station did not include a microphone, just an old J-38 key and a bug. I believe that his first microphone came with a Drake 2 meter FM transceivers in the 1970s.

During the over 30 years that I knew Mary, he was an active member of QIN (the Indiana CW traffic net). About the time of retirement from ISU. Mary became active in the Indiana 75 meter Phone Net, and continued with both of these activities until a few months ago when health problems curtailed his operating activities. The Indiana Traffic Net and 2 meter FM were the only places where you would hear the call W9KT by voice. Most of his operating activities were spent in the CW portions of the 40 and 80 meter bands.

During his time as a Ham, Marv mentored and Elmer'd many aspiring and new hams. He was one of the original VE license examiners when the program was started by the FCC, and continued to be active in the program until his sight began to fail.

If Marv was not the first, he was one of the earliest Trustees of W9UUU, the Gaskins



Memorial Club Station of the WVARA, Inc., and for years took an active interest in the operation of W9UUU.

When the FCC initiated the program of allowing Extra Class licensees to request unused 1x2 call signs, Marv was in the first group to obtain a new call. It was at that time that he was assigned W9KT. During this period, K9LE, W9IN, and W9TH were also issued to WVARA members.

Mary was a long time member of the ARRL, the WVARA, and a charter member and first president of the Banks of the Wabash Chapter 204 of the QCWA (that means having been licensed at least 25 years ago). I believe that Marv was a 50 year plus member of the QCWA.

With the passing of Marv Carmony, W9KT, the Wabash Valley and the Amateur Radio Community have lost a First Class Operator and a fine gentleman. May your OSOs be free of QRM and the QRN at a minimum. Farewell, good friend.

My first knowledge of Marv was long before I met him or knew he was a ham radio operator. My mother started college after all us kids were out on our own. She did not graduate from high school, but got her GED and started college at ISU. Of course all students had to take the general education courses that included the English and literature classes. Although my mother liked college and was trying to keep up with the younger students she never mentioned much about any particular class or course...Except, Marv Carmony. She thought he was the best professor she had. She confirmed that statement years later.

I did not meet him until after I had my license about 13 years ago. Marv was indeed a very impressive gentleman. He had a thoughtful look, but was quick with a smile. Marv was a gentleman's gentleman. Always well groomed and although the ravages of age were upon him, he was my hero. I made that decision myself, not just a repeat of my mother's opinion; he was an individual that earned everyone's respect without prejudice.

My earliest memories of Marv are very fond ones. In 1975, following the monthly WVARA meetings that were held on the campus of Rose-Hulman, it was customary to stop at a long-gone east side restaurant known as the Eat-a-Terria.

One month, shortly after having received my Novice license, I was lucky enough to be seated across the long table from Marv. He took an immediate interest in this young Amateur Radio operator, and told a story about assembling and operating a Heathkit AT-1 transmitter. As you know, Marv had a gift for the Queen's English, and the story he related about the old Heathkit really captivated this 15 year old. I have never owned an AT-1, but always think of Marv and the experiences that he related that evening whenever I do see one, or see something published regarding the first ham radio transmitter Heathkit ever offered.

In later years, I came to appreciate Marv's CW operating ability. At Field Day in 2004, Marv joined us for a brief time to operate CW. Unfortunately, his health was already beginning to fail, but it had no effect on his operating skills. Having Marv come out and operate with us at Field Day that year was a distinct privilege, and a memory I will always treasure.
