

TWO NEW REPEATERS JOIN THE PARTY

Two new amateur repeaters are joining the list of disaster communications resources available in the local area this month. The new UHF repeater is on the air now, and the new VHF repeater is expected on the air within the next few weeks. Both are located at the Vermillion Co. EOC in Clinton, and result from federal funding through the CSEP program at Newport.

Both repeaters will operate under the supervision and call sign of WVARA member Kirt Lowrey, K9KSA, who is employed in that emergency office. The UHF system operates on 442.175 mHz, (447.175 mHz input) with about 200 watts ERP and an antenna at the 280 ft. level. The VHF repeater will operate on 146.715 mHz, with an antenna on top of the 300 ft. tower. Both are equipped to use a 151.4 Hz PL tone, if testing indicates the need. Local hams should program the PL tones into their radios now, along with the frequencies so that no additional efforts would be needed if the tone is found to be required.

Vermillion EMA director Ray Colombo, has been a long-time advocate of using ham radio in emergency situations, and has included several amateur radio transmitters in his emergency operating center. The new repeaters were funded by federal money, requested in support of the chemical stockpile program, after recent disasters showed the need for our help. EMA director Colombo has already demonstrated his belief in our capabilities, and says that the new equipment will help us help him. He says the next new budget cycle includes additional funds requested to link the new UHF repeater into the statewide disaster network.

Curt, K9KSA, says repeater coordination for the project was made possible by the help of John Voigt, K9GBO, who released his coordinated UHF frequency for this use. Coverage maps for the new repeaters will be drawn after several months of testing and adjustment.

The October 7, 2005 WVARA Board Meeting was called to order at 9:20 p.m. by Club President, Gary Adams, W9EEU. Also present were Vice President, Don Pine, K9DRP; Secretary, Debbie Shorter, KC9AOR; Treasurer, Chuck Procarione, W9COD; Past President, Kevin Berlen, K9HX; Past President, Steve Shorter, NT9T, Trustee, David Pifer, N9YNF, and guests Gary Wheeler, K9ERE, and Jim Osburn, WD9EYB. The Secretary's Report was approved as published in *The Bandspread*. The Treasurer's Report was given by Chuck, W9COD, who reported a balance in all accounts of \$4168.58 and moved that the report be approved; Don, K9DRP, seconded the motion and the motion carried. Old **Business:** (1) The Packet Digipeater was discussed; (2) Equipment Disposal: David, N9YNF, e-mailed the Board a list of equipment. That list was reviewed and discussed. Section Emergency Test

Local hams participated in an unannounced net called in support of, and at the same time as, the recent Section Emergency Test. A total of 14 stations joined the net, several of which were mobile, and all but two of which were operated on emergency power sources.

Amateur operators were alerted to the activity by pagers operating on the K9IKQ repeater system as a demonstration of the recently installed Local Amateur Paging System (LAPS.) The system allows hams to monitor the repeater from a radio carried on their belt, and if desired only hear messages preceeded by a tone alert.

Net control for the activity was conducted from a public demonstration at the Clay County Public Library, using the local ARES communications trailer as a base. The general public, and local government officials were given tours of the facility and came away with a better understanding of what we can do.

Dear Dr. Elmer,

What is the best way you can think of to share this new hobby with my friends, and maybe get them interested in getting their licenses?

The best way to create an initial curiosity is probably through a combination of "show and tell" and display of enthusiasm, at the same time.

It's a little difficult to do that, however, because the hobby can be highly technical and complicated, and because there are so many areas of interest, it can be difficult to stay focused.

Two parts that are almost universally interesting are the general subject of emergency services, and participation in conversations with people in distant lands. If your current license doesn't include HF, you can still demonstrate it by simply listening to HF bands. Just tell your friends that you will soon have the license to call them back.

Recent hurricane problems along the Gulf Coast resulted in hams from all parts of America creating HF nets to help out. Those nets provided the opportunity to demonstrate both emergency services and conversations with (sort of) distant lands.

There are also contests nearly every weekend and more special events stations than you can shake a stick at. If your license permits, you can invite a friend over to the house and allow them to talk on the radio. If you have the license but not the radio there are places you can go, including the WVARA club station, where you can use their radios.

If you can determine the interests of your friends you can find something interesting for both of you to do. Don't spend too much time on the details at first, just get them hooked. The ham community will help do the rest.


