FRED MAHALEK, K9EBK

I had an eyeball QSO with Fred about a month before he passed away. He was shopping at Menards for stuff he needed for some project he was working on. I hope he had time to finish it.

On the first of my two stints as Bandspread editor, Fred published it on an old mimeograph machine. I hated cutting those stencils on my typewriter, but the final result wasn't too bad. (Gary, can you imaging writing the BS without a word processor? Scary!)

Fred kept that old machine purring like a kitten. I think he was kind of sad when I started using Applewriter and put the paper together using cut-and-paste in the archaic sense.

Fred has been around as long as I remember. He was of the old Mahalek, Siebenmorgen, Hoffman, Meier, Pernow, Moench (Herman), Cottom, etc. generation. They were the core of the club and all were active and worked hard for the WVARA.

Fred knew a lot about radio and electronics and was active on the air. He was a regular contributor to the ITN for many years. Terre Haute could always rest assured that if there was traffic, he would always be ready and willing to pick it up.

He liked to mess with antennas and in later years was dependent mostly on his 75-m doublet. A while back he wasn't being heard on the air and it turned out that his antenna was down. Many local hams would have jumped at the opportunity to help him get it back up, but I personally didn't know anything about it until it was fixed.

One of the greatest contributions to Ham radio in these parts was his dedication and hard work as a volunteer examiner. For many years Fred considered it an opportunity and a obligation to see to it that the local exams went off smoothly.

I'm sorry to see him go.

FRED J. MAHALEK, K9EBK

Fred Mahalek, K9EBK, became a Silent Key on May 25. He lived a good life and was 90 years old.

Fred was a long-time member of the WVARA, INC. and the local ham community. Fred's tenure in the WVARA goes back to the days of the VHF Picnic held annually at Turkey Run

State Park. He was one of the organizers and hard workers of that event. It was the predecessor of the WVARA Hamfest of which he was very active for a number of years.

For many years Fred was an active member of the Indiana Traffic Net which meets daily at 3910 KHz. In the 1980s, Fred and several others had a FM RTTY net that ran one evening a week on a 2 meter simplex frequency. It was at the beginning of the use of computer linked keyboards through a conventional modem with the demise of the old Model 15 mechanical monsters. Transmission was in AFSK because the frequency was above 30 MHz. The old Radio Shack and Commodore Computers were the units of choice then.

For many years, the BANDSPREAD was published by Fred and some helpers on an old Mimeograph machine. It wasn't as fancy as the current BANDSPREAD, but contained good information about ham activities in the area.

Fred was a flea market hound, and was one of the organizers of the Dayton Hamvention Bus. On the way home, we stopped to eat at a cafeteria on the West side of Indianapolis, not as fancy as Shapiro's, but of Fred's choosing. Typical of Fred's frugality.

When ARRL organized the Volunteer Examiner Corps, Fred was the original coordinator for the WVARA. He held that position for almost 15 years.

If my memory has not completely gone to mush, I believe Fred was a recipient of the Brentlinger Award a number of years ago. I do remember that he and Polly Polakowski, KD9OK, were given a special award one year for their long service with *THE BANDSPREAD*.

Fred was a quiet man. A real gentleman and a gentle man. He was a great "Elmer" to many of the active hams in the area. He not only was a "hands on" helper, but on a "one-on-one" basis taught many people the fundamentals of electronics that one had to know to pass the written portions of the Novice and Technician exams.

Fred's working career was spent with the U.S. Postal Service from where he retired as Assistant Postmaster in Terre Haute.

I don't know about you, but I miss ole Fred. He had a wry and subtle sense of humor that got to you in a way that you don't soon forget.

The President's Corner

The past few weeks have seen the remnants of Erin bring flooding to the US, Dean sweep through the Caribbean and Mexico, unrelated flooding across the upper Midwest, and severe weather just to our north. All of this points out that we could be thrust into an emergency situation at any time for a variety of reasons. It also

points out that as amateur radio operators we need to be prepared to respond quickly. In any situation like these, or others that may affect our region, we would not have the luxury of sitting down and making a list of items needed, gathering them up for transportation, or preparing in many other ways to meet the communication needs. The time to prepare is now, before we find ourselves needing to respond.

An excellent source to help us prepare is the ARRL's continuing education programs. The ARRL offers three emergency communication courses. These are self study courses and take an estimated 25 hours to complete over an 8 to 12 week schedule. The ARRL also has a link to the FEMA site where you can find the NIMS (National Incident Management System) training courses, which are a requirement to work with many organizations.

Our ability to respond will depend on how well we have prepared in advance. If you have questions, or need any help finding or completing some of this training, let us know. We have an abundance of resources from which to draw and would be glad to help out. Be Ready!!
