

EMERGENCY TO-GO KITS DEMONSTRAT

The April meeting of the WVARA was to have been a talk by Professor Prodip Dutta, from the ISU Department of Geology on the subject of earthquakes. Unfortunately, Dr. Dutta was taken seriously ill shortly before the meeting date so we went ahead with the second part of the program which was a demonstration by a number of our members of their emergency to-go kits.

A to-go kit is basically a bag, box, case or whatever which contains emergency equipment that can be grabbed on the spur of the moment and either taken on the road as an ARES member might be called upon to do or they can be used right at home if such an emergency requires it.

Each kit demonstrated was different, having been designed to suit the needs and personalities of the people who made them. They ranged from the fairly simple to the very complex.

Dr. Dutta is now recovering from his illness and we hope very much to have him with us for the May meeting to talk about earthquakes in general and specifically, the New Madrid fault that runs along the Mississippi River from south of Memphis, TN, through our general area.

Recent seismic activity around the world makes this a timely topic. It is only a matter of time before the New Madrid fault shifts again.

Terre Haute Triathlon





It seems like just the other day, certainly not a year ago, but already local officials have asked the ham community for help managing this year's edition of the Terre Haute Triathlon. This annual event expects about 350 persons to compete in a combination of three events, including an 800M swim, a 40K bike race, and an 8K run.

This year's event will begin on the morning of May 22, and complete by early afternoon. Hams will be stationed along each of the event three paths, and will assist event management in keeping track of details. Emergencies along the route will have priority, of course, but officials learned the value of our radios several years ago, and are hoping for our help again this year.

The entire operation is centered around Hawthorne Park on the east side of Terre Haute. A number of positions are available for Hams to help. The Net Control, Swim and Transition positions on the course are the first to be utilized. The event begins with the first wave of swimmers hitting the water at 8:00 A.M.

After the swim the participants head to the transition area to get their bikes and head

out on the bike course. On the bike course 6 radio positions plus the sag wagon monitor the participants. After the bike course participants go through transition again, and head off on the 8K run. 2 positions are staffed along the run.

The first place participant will be through the entire event in about 1 hour 35 minutes. (about 10 minutes for the swim. 1 hour for the bike and 25 minutes for the run) Yet we continue to monitor even the slowest of participants which could be 3 hours or more. Each ham on the course is released from their position after the last participant passes them on the return trip. Your position on the course will determine your time to report and the time you will be released.

Hams able to participate this year should contact Event Coordinators Dave Littleiohn or David Pifer as soon as possible, especially if a specific assignment is desired. Even if you have no assignment in mind, but you plan to be there on May 22, please contact one of them to let them know that you will definitely be showing up to help that morning.


At the request of Don West, from the Indiana Department of Homeland Security, we applied for a club call sign under the name





The "***" will bring up the closest radar to the APRS station. If you want to force the radar image from a particular radar station just use the 3 letter designation of that NOAA radar.


When you bring up that link or any of these links, you will notice a zoomable map from Google and in the upper right corner of the map, you can also get a satellite or a hybrid image.


The many radar watchers we have during a storm event could create a tab in their browser for each station that checks in and reports that they have their APRS station on. Be sure to ask for their SSID.




This shows all the APRS stations in the area serviced by the Lincoln IL radar. As you can see APRS is a popular mode of operation by many hams.

As a cautionary note, any of these links may not show the station you want if they have turned off their transmitter for a few days. You will note at the top of each page the time the station was last heard from, its direction of travel and speed. Also note you must have the correct SSID. These are the –X numbers after the call. These can be changed by the station owner at any time.
